Laying Down Our Stones – John 7:53-8:11

The <u>condemning</u> spirit of the religious leaders (John 7:53-8:6, Matthew 7:1-5, & Romans 3:23).

The merciful spirit of Jesus (John 8:7-11a, Acts 9:1-19, Luke 9:51-56, & Galatians 6:1).

The <u>changed</u> spirit of the woman caught in adultery (John 8:11b, Luke 7:36-50, 2 Corinthians 5:17, & Ephesians 2:10).

Questions for Discussion & Application:

- 1. What was surprising, confusing, or helpful from today's message?
- 2. Do you have any questions about why it is uncertain if John 7:53-8:11 is a part of the original Gospel written by John? (A helpful resource to explore this further is: gotquestions.org/John-7-53-8-11)
- 3. What is a condemning spirit? Why does a true experience of God's forgiveness through Christ contradict such a condemning spirit?
- 4. If we do not have a condemning spirit does this mean that we should have no discernment about what is right and wrong? If not, then how can we have such discernment without having a condemning attitude?
- 5. In what relationship(s) do you need to have a more merciful spirit? What will showing mercy in this relationship look like?
- 6. In what ways does an experience of God's undeserved mercy and forgiveness change us? Why does it change us? How has it changed you?
